I was born in Bombay, India and hold a Master's degree in Arts from both India and the United States. Although I am an American citizen, I have been able to preserve my Indian heritage and incorporate elements of it into my artwork, blending them with Western influences. I work primarily in digital media and installations, while sculptures and paintings remain integral to my practice. My multi layered artwork addresses women's issues and explores the conflicts between the spiritual and material worlds. The works are spiritual, yet the notion of religiosity they evoke is universal rather than specific. They also depict women's hopes, fears, pleasures, and pains.

I have held numerous solo exhibitions in India and America. My work has been showcased in countless group exhibitions in the United States and abroad, at prestigious galleries and museums such as the Museum of Modern Arts in New Delhi, Hunterdon Museum, Newark Museum, William Benton Museum, and others across the country. I also served as the chairperson for the National Association of Women Artists in New York. My work was selected for inclusion on the Smithsonian Museum of Asian Pacific American Center's website. My artworks are part of various collections, including the N.J. State Museum, Montclair Museum, Jersey City Museum, Hunterdon Museum of Art, Air India, the Indian Embassy, and several other public spaces and private collections.

I have received numerous awards and fellowships, including two grants from the N.J. State Council on the Arts for sculptures and paintings, as well as support from the Dodge Foundation and the N.J. Innovative Printmaking Fellowship at Rutgers University. Additionally, I have received two awards from the National Association of Women Artists in New York: the Amelia Peabody Memorial Award and the Elizabeth Morse Genius Foundation Award.

Most of my work, dealing with issues of faith, is about search and survival, both personal and political. I focus on the themes of feminism and social issues in the South Asian and East Asian diaspora in the United States. I often question the elusive nature of faith in my sculptures and paintings. The work is spiritual, but the notion of religiosity is universal rather than specific in nature.

The large architectural structures are structures of faith for me; faith in oneself, humankind and divine power. At times Indian gods and goddesses go hand in hand with American pop culture icons such as Big Bird, Super Woman and Spider Man, because they both symbolise hope and justice. Future generations will hopefully view them as a representation of our contemporary mythology. Although the sculptures appear comical or humorous at first sight, they also address religious, political and cultural issues created by multiculturalism in our globalised society.

The wall works and hanging mobiles depict woman's hopes, fears, pains, and confusions as well. They address their plight in modern America; including the struggle to balance their family life and career goals. Women are paired with Indian goddesses who can perform many impossible tasks.

My work also contains a multitude of symbols, including ladders, puzzles and collapsing towers. After my daughter was bitten by a cobra, the image of a snake also appears in my work every now and then which symbolise the power of healing. Sometimes I would have the urge to burn my work. These burnt images are symbolic of purification and transformation and remind me of Shiva, the Hindu God who is both creator and destroyer.

As an immigrant, I grapple with the fear of losing my culture and traditions. This conflict between holding on and letting go deeply informs my art, reflecting the dualities of belonging and alienation, preservation and evolution. I search myself through art and it helps me survive and have faith in this confused and often contradictory world.






